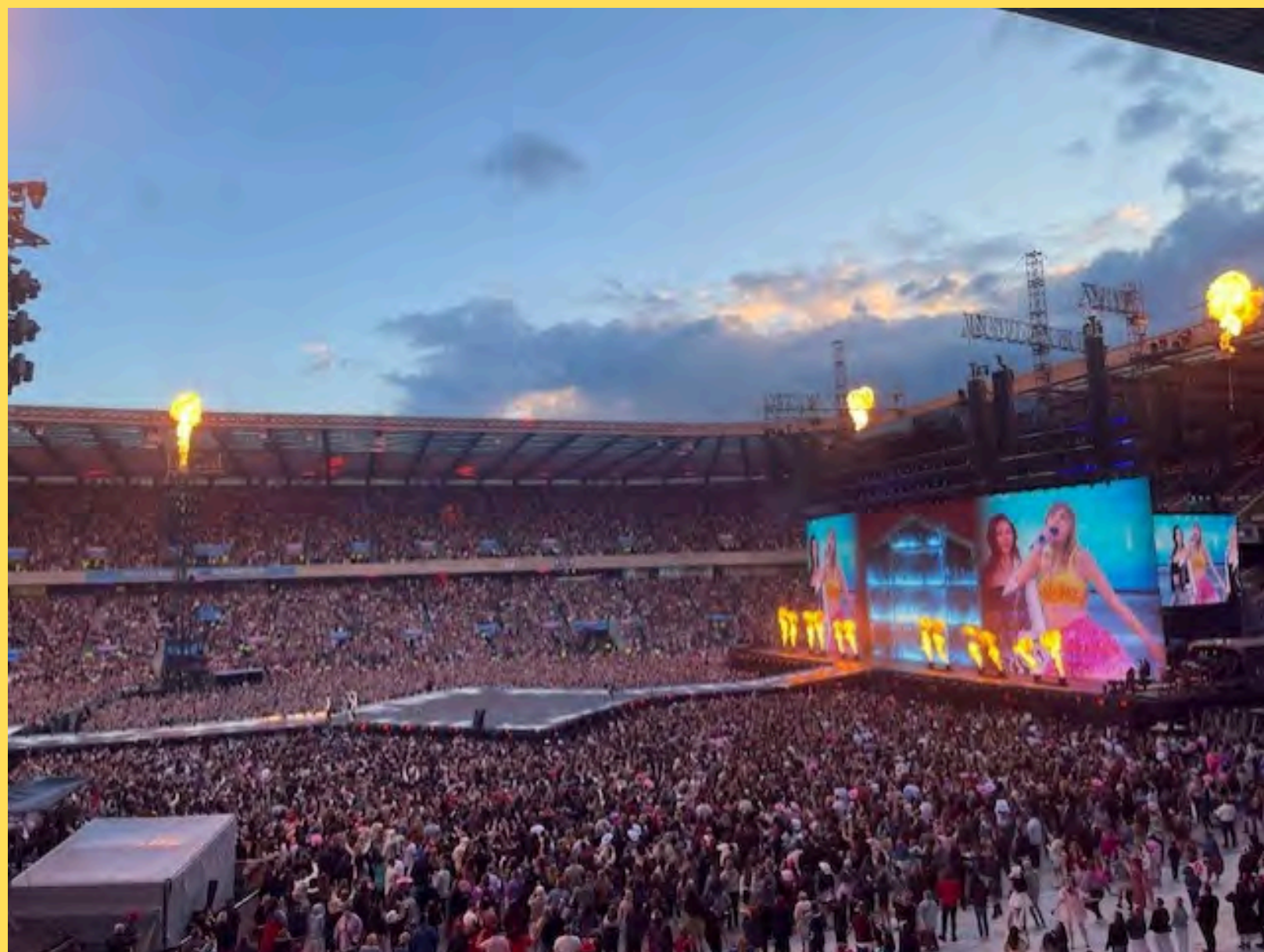




TAYLOR: IT WAS TRULY *ENCHANTING* TO MEET YOU

New Faces of the Olympic Games

History of the Olympic Games

The modern Olympic Games were reestablished by Baron Pierre de Coubertin in 1896, with the first Games held in Athens. Since then, the Olympics have grown to become the world's most important sporting event, bringing together athletes from almost every nation. Paris first hosted the Games in 1900 and again in 1924. In 2024, Paris will host the Games for the third time, marking a century since their last edition in the city.

Infrastructure

Paris 2024 will highlight iconic infrastructures and historic sites while minimizing the construction of new structures. Among the main sites:

- Stade de France: It will host the opening and closing ceremonies as well as the athletics competitions.
- Grand Palais: Transformed into an arena for fencing and taekwondo.
- The Seine: Unique site for open water swimming and triathlon events.
- Place de la Concorde: Will host urban sports such as skateboarding, BMX freestyle, and breakdancing.
- Olympic Village: Built in Saint-Denis, it will be converted into housing and offices after the Games, illustrating sustainable use of infrastructure.

Competitors

- Simone Biles (United States, gymnastics): After her triumphant return to competition, she is ready to dazzle again.
- Eliud Kipchoge (Kenya, marathon): The marathon king could continue to set new records.
- Kanoa Igarashi (Japan, surfing): A favorite for gold in this new Olympic discipline.
- Teddy Riner (France, judo): The double Olympic champion and judo legend will try to win a new gold medal in front of his audience

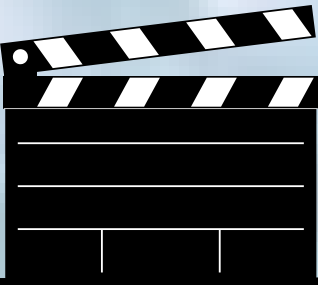
Sports

The Paris 2024 Games will highlight several new sports to attract a younger and more diverse audience:

- Breakdance: Introduced for the first time at the Olympics, breakdance will bring an urban and modern touch to the competitions.
- Skateboard: Already present at Tokyo 2020, it will continue to captivate young people thanks to its spectacular events.
- Surfing: The competitions will be held in Tahiti, adding an exotic dimension to the Olympics.
- Climbing: Also already introduced in Tokyo, this discipline highlights the strength, strategy and agility of athletes.

These new sports add to traditional disciplines, offering an unprecedented variety of sporting spectacles.
